Oslo Medicines Initiative (OMI) Stakeholder engagement





To create a neutral platform on which to build **collaboration** between public and private sectors to improve access to effective, novel, high-priced medicines in the WHO European Region. Three main themes to underpin OMI are transparency, solidarity and sustainability.

- A collaborative platform among stakeholders (Member States in the WHO European Region and non-state actors representing industry, the public and payers) was provided to jointly identify key actions to improve access, to ensure discussion and debate and to identify potential policy directions with both a political and a technical line.
- OMI carried out consultations with all stakeholders, provided a series of technical reports and webinars and published targeted policy papers.
- The process consisted of various phases, including a landscape and needs assessment, building the evidence base, drafting results and dissemination.



The OMI has fostered **in-depth dialogue with all relevant stakeholders** on issues of solidarity, transparency and sustainability in the pharmaceutical sector.

Technical reports

Eight <u>technical reports</u> were commissioned to <u>analyse the</u> state of the market and policy implementation, and to identify policy considerations that may help Member States and the industry move towards ensuring equitable, sustainable access to effective, novel, high-priced medicines.

WHO Regional Committee for Europe

At the 71st session of the Regional Committee for Europe, held virtually in September 2021, the WHO Regional Office for Europe co-hosted a <u>technical</u> <u>briefing</u> with the Government of Norway to provide an **update on progress made** with the OMI, and invited perspectives from Member States, the European Commission, and non-State actors.

Webinar series

Five <u>webinars</u> were held January to February 2022 to further engage OMI key stakeholder groups, and to enable open discussion and knowledge exchange of emerging findings from the technical reports from diverse perspectives.
